

MLA Argumentative Essay Outline

I. Introduction

- A. Hook: Start off by posing a question that will grab readers' attention and make them want to read more.
- B. Background: Present some background information on the topic, such as its history or current context in society.
- C. Thesis Statement: Clearly state your opinion on the topic and why it is important.
